

Online Recall Audition Guidelines: 2025 Entry

CertHE Foundation Acting (Stage & Screen)

Congratulations! You are through to the final stage of our audition process.

If you live outside of the UK, we have automatically invited you to a live online recall. If you would prefer to attend one of our in-person recall events either at LIPA (various dates), or planned in either the USA (New York City, January 2025 or Chicago, February 2025), Norway or Hong Kong (both March 2025) please email <u>international@lipa.ac.uk</u>

We understand how nerve-wracking the prospect of auditioning can be, so please read these guidelines carefully. Remember we're interested in finding out about you as an individual, so please try to relax, be yourself and enjoy the day.

Guidelines for your Stage Two live, online recall

Our online recalls will take place on Microsoft Teams and will last approx. 30 minutes. You will be allocated an interview time and date, typically with a minimum of two weeks' notice. Times are GMT or BST as appropriate. You will receive the joining link approximately 24 hours prior to the interview.

Our online recalls reflect our in-person ones as much as possible. It's a two way conversation; we want to get to know you and you can ask us any questions you might have.

For your recall audition, we would ask you to prepare the following:

Contemporary monologue redirect (no longer than 2 minutes)

You will present your two-minute contemporary monologue again (i.e. the one you presented in your self-tape). After you have performed the monologue, a member of our Acting staff may give you direction on your monologue, advice and instruction on how you might approach the monologue from a different angle, helping you to understand other aspects of the character through the language the playwright has provided. You are expected to incorporate this advice.

On occasion, staff may request to see your self-created piece (no longer than 2 minutes). Again, you may be asked to reconsider some aspects of the presentation or be redirected.

Verse speech (no longer than 2 minutes)

Please choose a two-minute verse speech, which demonstrates your ability to interpret heightened forms of speech and to communicate images and stories. Your selection is not restricted to conventional verse (i.e. Shakespeare), but can include contemporary verse, such as works by Inua Ellams and Kae Tempest. The verse speech may be, but is not limited to:

- Spoken word
- Modern, classical and performance poetry
- Song lyrics
- Shakespeare

Screen duologue scene

For this session you will act in a TV scene (at the end of this document) with a LIPA Acting student. Please invest in some independent research; observe what works on screen as compared to the stage. The scene you are shooting is attached to these guidelines, you choose either character A or B. We would like to see the choices you make and then after a redirect observe your ability to absorb notes.

Interview

Although not a formal interview, the panel might ask questions to better understand who you are, your aspirations and suitability for our training programmes. Please prepare for this by familiarising yourself in depth with the course content on our website. During the interview we want to get to know you better and understand more about what you expect to gain from training with us. The panel may ask you the following questions, which includes the opportunity for you to ask us questions too:

- What makes you an ideal LIPA student?
- What additional skills and qualities would you bring to the programme?
- When embarking on a rigorous practical training averaging 30+ hours per week, what are your personal mechanisms for maintaining physical and mental stamina and resilience?
- What artistic experience has had the biggest impact on you, and why?
- What would be your dream project to be involved in, and why?
- Do you have any questions for us?

Do you have any access needs related to a disability that may require specialist arrangements?

At these stages of the audition process, we may also consider you for any of the following undergraduate Acting courses:

- BA (Hons) Acting
- BA (Hons) Acting (Contemporary Performance)

- CertHE Foundation Acting (Stage & Screen)

We do not tell you the outcome of your audition on the day itself. We aim to inform you of the outcome of your audition within three weeks.
